Welcome Letter

May 1, 2018

Dear Voting Members and Visitors for our 2018 Sierra Pacific Assembly,

Welcome to the thirty-first Assembly of our Sierra Pacific Synod! For the first three days of June, we will gather in Sacramento under the theme ***“We are Church Together: This is Our Neighborhood.”*** God has called us to be mindful of our relationships with God and with each other. Our theme verse, Luke 10:27, offers the words of Jesus as he shares what he calls the two greatest commandments, *“You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself.”* In other places of the Bible, the question is asked, “Who is our neighbor?” or “Who was neighbor to that person?” It’s a question with which we in the church continue to wrestle – how, as followers of Jesus, are we called to love and serve our neighbors locally and globally? How do we keep our eyes open to see the needs of our neighbors, and how do we keep our hearts open to respond in love and hope? We will be blessed to hear from a variety of Lutheran leaders from around our country and around our world as we ponder these questions and more.

Our Keynote Speaker will be Rozella White, who serves as the Houston City Director for Mission Year, an organization committed to helping young adults become advocates for God’s justice in their neighborhoods and in the world. She previously served as the Director for Young Adult Ministry for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Ms. Dana Dutcher, who serves as ELCA Global Missions Manager for Relationships in Asia and the Pacific, Madagascar, West and Central Africa, will be our Churchwide Representative on behalf of Presiding Bishop Eaton. Bp. Medardo Gomez of the Lutheran Church of El Salvador, one of our three Companion Synods, will be with us to bring greetings and preach at our Closing Worship Service. And we are pleased to welcome Bishop Tracie Bartholomew of the New Jersey Synod of the ELCA as our Bible Study Leader and Opening Worship Preacher. Our Parliamentarian for this Assembly will be Mr. David Swartling, former Secretary of the ELCA. And we will again be blessed this year by the return of the members of the Sacramento Gay Men’s Chorus, who will be with us Friday evening to bless our time of Worship.

A Friday evening Banquet will include a celebration of significant anniversaries of the ordination of clergy and of the founding of congregations in our synod. Information about those people and congregations who are celebrating anniversaries can be found in the pages following the Synod Assembly Agenda. ***Meal events require that you be either a registered Voting Member of the Assembly or a registered Visitor. No tickets will be available for purchase at the Assembly.***

This year, we will again be using Guidebook technology and software to provide information needed for Voting Members. - If you are bringing materials for distribution to Assembly Voting Members, there will be an additional table in the Display Area where these will be made available. **No documents may be distributed on the Assembly floor without the approval of the Synod Secretary.**
- There are several workshops available for you to attend on Saturday afternoon -- all of which are offered in the hope of strengthening/encouraging your ministries in the place where God is calling you to serve. There will also be other opportunities for conversation throughout the time we are gathered.

I offer my profound thanks to the members of the Assembly Planning Team, our Synod Staff, and those from the Sacramento area who have helped to plan for this Assembly, as well as Ms. Mary Wiberg and Pr. Tita Valeriano, Co-Chairs of the Assembly Planning Committee.

Please keep our Assembly in prayer as we trust God's enlivening Spirit to gather us around the theme, ***"We Are Church Together: This is Our Neighborhood."*** Everyone who has been working hard to prepare for this gathering is excited to welcome you to the 2018 Sierra Pacific Synod Assembly -- the thirty-first time we will have gathered in this way!

FLOOR PLAN First Floor



He grew up in Solana Beach, a town located near the Pacific Ocean twenty miles north of San Diego. After graduating from San Diego State University in Encinitas, he served in the US Navy and went on to graduate from San Diego State University in 1980, with a degree in History and a minor in Classics.

He attended Luther Theological Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota, and upon graduation in 1984, was called to serve as Associate Pastor at Zion Lutheran Church of Stockton. A year later he was called to serve as the Lead Pastor of Zion and served that ministry until the fall of 2004. He was then called to serve as Pastor of Lutheran Church of the Incarnation, Davis, California, in September of 2004. Mark was active in social justice and community organizing and in ecumenical and interfaith endeavors, including

“Celebration of Abraham” events in both San Joaquin and Yolo counties. He was elected as the fourth bishop of the Sierra Pacific Synod in April of 2008 and re-elected to a second term in 2014.

Married to Debbi in 1987, who retired as a high school principal in 2014, they have been blessed to live as a blended family with their four (now adult) children: Alyssa (Steve), Marshall, Justin (Connie), and Meaghann (Robert) and eight grandchildren – Hannah, Sadie, Christopher, Phillip, Scarlett, Ellie, Owen and Tre. David Swartling **Assembly Parliamentarian**

David Swartling was elected secretary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America at the 10th Churchwide Assembly in Chicago in August 2007. Mr. Swartling was the first layperson to hold this position in the church. Mr. Swartling attended Princeton University on a Navy Scholarship and served 4 years in the submarine force. Following his military service, he attended the University of Washington School of Law, where he was Executive Editor of the Washington Law Review. He practiced law in Seattle for more than 30 years, including 15 years as a named partner in the firm Mills Meyers Swartling. During this time, he was elected a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers. For many years, he was Editor-in-Chief of the Washington State Bar Association's Civil Procedure Deskbook. He also received the President's Award from

the Washington State Bar Association and the Harrison-Tweed Award from the American Bar Association for his professional activities.

Mr. Swartling is a life-long Lutheran and has served the ELCA in many capacities. He was the congregational president at Bethany Lutheran Church on Bainbridge Island, Washington; a member of the Synod Planning Group and Vice President of the Northwest Washington Synod; Chair of the Region 1 Governing Council; and Chair of the ELCA Foundation Board of Trustees. Upon his election as secretary, David and Barbara, his wife of 40+ years, relocated from Bainbridge Island to the Chicago area. They have two adult children: Christopher, an ESL teaching program manager employed by the Defense Language Institute in San Antonio, and Ryan, a chef in Seattle.

David and Barbara Swartling returned to Bainbridge Island in late 2013, following completion of his term as ELCA secretary. He rejoined the law firm of Mills Meyers Swartling in 2014, and served as managing attorney for two years. This workshop will provide the resources needed to explore hosting a Community Supported Agriculture drop site, or the sharing of unused land, or turning your underutilized kitchen into a vibrant community kitchen, all to generate the kind of local economic relationships that bind your congregation to farmer, fisherfolk, baker, and grower. Create a food hub that honors the broad spectrum of justice issues that involve the soil, creation care, workers' rights, the seasons, and the sea. It's justice work you can taste

and feel with each meal on the table.

Hospitality: Beyond Strategic Friendliness

Henri Nouwen describes hospitality as a two-sided approach to others that includes confrontation as well as receptivity. Does this surprise you? This workshop opens up a fascinating conversation about Christian hospitality. We'll explore Henri Nouwen's insights about the paradoxical nature of hospitality and put that into conversation with Dietrich Bonhoeffer's understanding of church. You'll leave the workshop with a better understanding of the difference between hospitality and "strategic friendliness."

His insights led to my giving a workshop on hospitality at the Worship Jubilee 2007. As a pastor, I see why congregations need to develop a deeper understanding of hospitality, and understand the fears and misunderstandings that can thwart that journey.

Light to All in the House: A workshop to equip congregations to welcome LGBTQ pastors into the call process

A conversation exploring how you can help your congregation to develop an intentional plan to be open to calling an LGBTQ pastor or another leader from a different context or community. Meet others who are working to build extraordinary congregations. You will learn more about Extraordinary Lutheran Ministries and our work in the post-2009 environment. You will also be introduced to resources and techniques you can take back to your congregation to help them begin and have conversations about a diversity of leaders. Learn about "minimization" and how to work through this and other barriers. Finally, share your good ideas and experiences to help others benefit from what you've learned.

Pr. Mary Stein-Webber and Pr. Sharon Stalkfleet
Extraordinary Lutheran Ministries

Pastor Sharon Stalkfleet, currently called by Sierra Pacific Synod to Intentional Interim Ministry. Sharon identifies as bi-sexual and was the 7th Extraordinarily Ordained Clergy serving ELCA congregations in 2002 and has participated with ELM (Extraordinary Lutheran Ministries) and its predecessor bodies to work for the full inclusion of LGBTQ pastors. She has served as the first pastor of Lutheran Ministry to Nursing Homes, Oakland and Alameda, as a hospice chaplain and interim pastor to Lutheran Church of the Cross, Berkeley and Trinity Lutheran Church in Alameda.

Mary Stein-Webber, MDiv, LMFT is very hopeful about presenting this workshop. God has gifted the church with brilliant LGBTQI people, and now the opportunity is now for congregations to call them as pastors. I am a Lutheran pastor, ordained in 1984. I have served three congregations; Phoenix, AZ, Long Beach, and Oakland both in California. I also am a Marriage and Family therapist, with a private practice in Alameda.

Around 2000 I began to volunteer my time with the then, Extraordinary Lutheran Ministries, serving on the candidacy for students who were not welcome into the ELCA. I served as chair of that ministry for many years, and in 2009 after the ELCA voted to include LGBTQI pastors into the church, the Candidacy responsibility fell to the synods of the ELCA.

I hope that you'll bring your questions and concerns and expertise to the workshop. There is a place for you.

Session 1 & 2, **Ventura**, 2nd floor

My Life In a Box

Whether you are a victim of a natural disaster, or have the burden/privilege of caring for an ailing family member, My Life In A Box was created to save you time, grief and unneeded expense when recovering from these types of life altering situations. This is a video based program developed by Laurie Ecklund Long, an emergency specialist with over a decade of experience as an author and national speaker. Laurie provides a wealth of information relating to surviving natural disasters, terminal illness, family loss and elder issues. Laurie learned many of her "survival skills" through the loss of 12 family members and close friends within a period of five years. During that time, and also through experiences related to 9/11 and Hurricane Katrina she began to investigate a variety of ways for individuals and businesses to face their losses and recover quickly. She created an emergency preparedness plan that allows people to build an emergency tool box so that within minutes of a home fire or disaster, they can leave their home with everything they need to rebuild their life. Janet Lane and Myra Squeo, both from Hope Lutheran Fresno, have been trained by the author to facilitate this one hour presentation.

Janet Lane

Synod Resource Center/Hope Lutheran, Fresno

Janet Lane is a trained CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) member in Fresno. This training led to interest and ultimately training in the My Life in a Box Program. We have presented this program at Hope, to staff, and are looking forward to sharing it with other groups and organizations. We have other workshops scheduled in the Fresno area over the next several months. In her roles at Hope Lutheran Church, Fresno and at the Synod Resource Center, Janet has found having emergency plans in place makes work and home life ready for anything.

Session 2, **Trinity**, 2nd floor

Planning for the End of Life

"If I ever got really sick and couldn't tell you about my wishes about the decisions you'd face at the end of my life, I would be afraid you wouldn't know what I'd like. Could we talk about that now? I'd feel better if we did." Could you imagine having a conversation like that with your family? No matter what our age, planning for the end-of-life can be difficult. It may be hard to face the idea of our own death or that of those we love. We may find it hard to initiate a conversation with our family members or with our aging parents. As difficult as these barriers may be, taking time to consider one's own wishes and communicating those wishes to family members can be a great gift to them by easing the difficulty of decision-making when they are affected by grief and time pressure. Specifying your own wishes helps assure your values are respected, minimizes financial costs, and eases the pressure of family decision-making at a time of stress.

Scott Trevithick

Interim Pastor, Holy Cross Lutheran, Reno, NV

The presenter is an ordained Presbyterian pastor who has served in parish ministry in Presbyterian and Lutheran congregations, as a hospital chaplain, and as a director of regional non-profits serving seniors. In those settings, he is experienced at accompanying people in crisis or who are coping with loss and grief, assisting them in talking about difficult subjects and helping them prepare for end-of-life decisions.

Saving SNAP

Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits are threatened in the coming re-authorization of the Farm Bill. It is crucial to the hungry and food insecure in America that we advocate that a fully funded SNAP Program that is not block granted be included in the Farm Bill. Without a robust SNAP program many would go hungry. Food banks and churches could not take up the slack. Our elected officials in Washington must be flooded with letters, emails, visits and phone calls! Come learn how to be an effective advocate to save SNAP!

100th Anniversary as a Congregation

Lutheran Church Of The Master Sacramento, CA

The history of Lutheran Church of the Master began as an immigrant story. In 1918 thirty Swedish immigrants arrived in Sacramento and formed a congregation as Zion Lutheran in a small church at 25th and N Streets. They called Pastor A.P.G. Anderson to lead them, growing as a congregation until they recognized the need for a larger church home. In 1927 Swedish Prince Vilhelm came to Sacramento. As part of his official visit planted a Cedar of Lebanon tree at Zion Lutheran to recognize the congregation's Swedish roots.

Two generations later, in 1950, the church built a new building at 21st and Larkin Way. They took the name of Luther Memorial Church under the guidance of Pastor Elmer Johnson. The postwar baby boom and Sacramento's urban expansion brought many new citizens and members to the church. Luther Memorial sponsored several new mission churches during those years, including All Saints Lutheran on 24th Street, which formed in 1958. Luther Memorial expanded into the next phase of its life under the direction of newly installed Pastor Ragnar Kastman.

Settling on an open parcel south of William Land Park, the church broke ground on an innovative new building that used tilt-up concrete wall construction, one of the first of its kind in the city. The children of Zion Lutheran's early members were now teenagers and the new Luther Memorial buildings featured a large social hall, classrooms and an expanded sanctuary to accommodate the congregation's Sunday school, music programs, choir and holiday events. New families joined, bringing with them the traditions of their countries of origin, merging with descendants of the original Scandinavian founders.

The church complex that stands today at 1900 Potrero Way was the vision of a hopeful, committed congregation. Through the 1960s and 70s members initiated new mission projects, sponsored newly arriving families from Vietnam, and established a sister parish with the Lutheran Church of Rwanda. In 1976 Pastor Glen Johnson oversaw the merger of Luther Memorial and All Saints, uniting the two congregations under the name it is known as today, Lutheran Church of the Master.

Music has been at the heart of LCM's worship program since the early years when the magnificent pipe organ was installed in the choir loft. Now restored, the pipe organ offers a profound accompaniment to

worship services. The church choir has many members who have been singing at LCM for decades and includes soloists as well as a men's chorus. Within the congregation are many talented musicians who graciously contribute to the church's musical program, including a flautist, harpist, violinist and pianists. For the past twenty years LCM has also enjoyed performances by their own hand bell choir and now has a praise band to enhance the church's flourishing musical programs. The entire congregation appreciates the dedication and commitment of its musical members and welcomes new musicians and singers who would like to share their love of music with the community.

During the 1980s and 90s Lutheran Church of the Master saw continued change, a diminished membership, and growing demands to serve Sacramento's increasingly diverse community. The first woman to serve as Pastor, Deedee Lundhal, came in 1985 with her husband, Pastor Glenn Lundhal. Five different pastors during the next four decades ushered the congregation into the 21st century. Today, the Reverend Doctor Linda Boston serves LCM's congregation. She holds the distinction of being the first African American woman ordained on the West Coast. Lutheran Church of the Master, founded by immigrants and sustained by its devoted members over a century, now looks to the next century with hope and a firm belief in serving God by serving others.

75th Anniversary as a Congregation



St. Paul's Lutheran Church Vallejo, CA

St. Paul's humble beginnings began with a house church led by mission developer Pr. W.H, Moeller. During his one- year term from 1942-43, he grew the church until Pr. Joseph Peterson was called. Growth continued in the house church until they enough people and money to move into a building at 1300 Tuolumne St., the site where the church still meets. St. Paul's has had only 8 pastors in the last 75 years, supporting their leadership.

Like many congregations, there have been ups and downs in membership. We are now considered small, but we are mighty. The people of St. Paul's are active in the community and known as a welcoming place. We are involved in CROP walk, waterfront cleanup, bag lunches for the homeless, quilting group and support the SF Night Ministry, LWR projects, Lutheran Nursing home ministry, and a Christmas gift drive for a local nursing home.

We are moving forward in our ministry as we consider consolidating with another congregation in Vallejo, Lutheran Church of the Holy Trinity. So, we may cease to be St. Paul's but our ministry will move confidently into the future.



Lutheran Church Of The Cross Sacramento, CA

Set on the edge of the East Sacramento “Fabulous 40’s” neighborhood, is the small but mighty American Lutheran Church of the Cross. When this congregation met for the first time in the parsonage at 45th and H Streets, they were a “Diamond-in-the-Rough.” Now 75 years later, they have proven themselves to be as strong, resilient, and brilliant as a Diamond!

Our current Pastor, Rev. Michael Walton, stresses our need to have a personal relationship with God. We worship on Sundays alternating between a Traditional Communion Service and a Contemporary Communion Service. Our most popular service has to be The Blessing of the Animals outdoors in October when we reach out to our neighbors to bring their pets for a Blessing. We have had all kinds attend from dogs and cats, to turtles, hamsters, lizards, and, of course, our resident horses who give rides after this Service. This Service has been so successful we have now become a “Pet-Friendly” church, where you can bring your pets each Sunday. Another popular service would be the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service. Many of our Holiday services have included cantatas by our choir or plays written and performed by the Sunday School children.

The backbone of our congregation is our very active Women of the ELCA group which supplies much of the funding and legwork for our missions. Whether hosting Prayer Circles to holding Bake Sales, the women provide spiritual compassion, fun, and hard work to keep the ministries of Church of the Cross moving forward. Some of most innovative events include a baked potato sale, known as “The Spudtacular!”, a lucrative Yard, Craft & Bake Sale, a Mother’s Day Luncheon, a Stuff the Backpacks for the WIND Center, and Christmas gifts for students at Rock Point Navajo Mission School. Most recently, we have added a Pancake Breakfast and Classic Car Show dubbed “Hot August Morning” and an Annual Crab Feed in November to fuel the fires of funding the many outreach projects we accomplish each year.

You may ask, “Why does the focus seem to be on Fundraising?” Church of the Cross is a church with a mission - inside and outside our four walls. Every Sunday we leave to be the church in the world. Beyond our neighborhood we serve meals the 4th Friday of every month at St. John’s Shelter for Women and Children, and we are the only Sacramento congregation still doing this for over 30 years.

In partnership with the Episcopal and Presbyterian Church, we support Campus Ministry at City College and Sacramento State University. Our Social Hall is used for several AA and Al Anon groups. We provide a Christmas dinner and gifts for the clients of WIND Youth Services which offers services to homeless youth on the streets of Sacramento. Our annual trip to the Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission in Rock Point, Arizona provides an opportunity to reach out to the Navajo in that community by offering assistance with building projects, first aid and CPR classes, and a free vaccination program for their livestock.

We see our place in the community as a “jewel”, representing all that God wants us to be and do as Christians. And, like any congregation, we struggle with the ups and downs of being viable in today’s world and with the day to day needs of a church. But just as a gem that is created by time and pressure, we will persevere, and we will shine as we are determined to bring the news of Jesus Christ to all. So, as we celebrate our “Diamond Jubilee” 75th Anniversary, we look toward the next 75 years and beyond -serving each other, our community, and our world. Because Diamonds Are Forever!

Lutheran Church of Our Savior, San Francisco, Brief History:

The Lutheran Church of Our Savior, San Francisco, started as a store front church located at 1935 Ocean Ave. in San Francisco. The Rev. Robert H. Rismiller and his wife Lucille rented the vacant store front for \$35.00 per month, they cleaned it up and on **Sunday, August 8, 1943** as a "mission congregation", sponsored by the **American Lutheran Church**, held its very first worship service.

On Sunday, December 5, 1943 the Rev. R.H. Rismiller after the worship service, called to order the first congregational meeting. The congregation voted to adopt the constitution and gave themselves the name **Lutheran Church of Our Savior, San Francisco, California** and authorized the church council to incorporate. Two days later on December 7, 1943, Lutheran Church of Our Savior, San Francisco, California filed Articles of Incorporation. On December 14, 1943 they received the stamp of approval from the state of California and officially became the **Lutheran Church of Our Savior, San Francisco, Ca.**

The rest, as they say, is history.

Zion Lutheran Church Stockton, CA

Zion Lutheran church was formed in 1942 under the guidance of Rev. E.J. Roleder of Lodi. The name "Zion" is found throughout the Old Testament. It is most often referred to as the place where God dwells so the name serves as a reminder that God dwells among us. The original church building sat at the corner of Monroe and Willow streets, situated north of downtown Stockton and south of the Miracle Mile. In 1953 Zion purchased property in a small subdivision called Lincoln Village. At the time it consisted of a few hundred homes and a shop-

ping center but Zion members knew the area would grow. On this property Grace Lutheran Church was established under Rev. C.H.S. Hunziker.

In 1961, as more of Stockton's population moved to Lincoln Village, the downtown congregation of Zion and the young congregation of Grace decided to merge. The original Zion church building was sold in 1962 to the young Stockton Civic Theater, offering them their first permanent home and forever building a relationship between Zion and the Stockton arts community. To this day, Zion is known as a Christian community that celebrates and supports the arts. This is demonstrated through our hosting of the annual Zion Chamber Orchestra, our strong music program, and our highly sought after "For the Sake of Art" youth outreach program. As the two congregations merged their outreach and membership surged and they quickly outgrew the facilities so they started a building campaign to build a new sanctuary.

Situated at the corner of Porter Ave. and Gettysburg Pl., just a block west of Pacific Avenue, the new sanctuary was dedicated in 1966. The old sanctuary was converted to a fellowship hall and is now known as "Grace Hall" on the church campus. The church hosts many activities in Grace Hall and community organizations often request the use of the facility for their events. For over 50 years, the members and guests of Zion Lutheran Church have worshiped God in the sanctuary, and it's use continues today. In 1988, the Lutheran Church in America and the American Lutheran Church united to form the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The ELCA is currently one of the largest denominations in North America and has over 9,000 congregations. Being a member of one of the merged church bodies, Zion is now a proud member of the ELCA. The ELCA is a church that shares a living, daring confidence in God's grace, tracing their roots back through the mid-17th century, when early Lutherans came to America from Europe. Even before that, Martin Luther sought reform for the church in the 16th century, laying the framework for our beliefs. Though once enveloped by fields, the neighborhood surrounding Zion has undergone tremendous change over the decades. The campus is nestled between the heavily commercial district of Lincoln Center and encircled by low-income housing serving many of north Stockton's neediest residents. Yet no matter the changes, Zion's presence in Lincoln Village has remained and the church continues to live out its mission of "Sharing the light of Jesus Christ". Liberated by our faith, we embrace you as a whole person—questions, complexities and all. Join us as we do God's work in Christ's name for the sake of the world.

Celebration Plans:

We celebrated our 75th anniversary in October of 2017 in conjunction with celebrating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation and the burning of our mortgage.

50th Anniversary as a Congregation

Faith Lutheran Church Murphys, CA

Led by the Spirit and continuing to move forward in faith, Faith Lutheran Church, Murphys, celebrated its 50th year of our Lord's service to the people of Calaveras County on a clear and warm January 28, 2018. The day started with a beautiful, traditional Service of Holy Communion led by our present Pastor Karen Johnson. This was followed by a "Lutheran Lunch" (Swedish meatballs, German and Danish potatoes, Norwegian rye bread - you get the gist!). We fed nearly 100 souls (including 3 previous



pastors) who had traveled from various parts of California to participate. After lunch we returned to the sanctuary for a presentation by pastors and friends of Faith - speeches were made, congratulatory letters from absent pastors were read, our history was acknowledged - all-in-all an uplifting celebration!



Faith Lutheran Church began in the old Murphys Odd Fellows Hall with Pr. Verner Bildt called to serve from 1967-1970. We incorporated in May of 1968, and in 1969 purchased property in Murphys which would serve as the future site of our church plant. Meanwhile, in 1972 a very young and enthusiastic Pr. John Schaumburg was called to serve. We moved into a small house (Mitchler House) on our property; John helped to reconfigure a sanctuary, Sunday School was set up and we were officially a "church!" In 1976 Pr. Charlie Clark arrived, and thus began our outreach ministry in the community. We have always been blessed with wonderful interim ministers, such as Bishop Howard Weeg from 78-79 (and again in 1981-82). Bishop Weeg and his wife suffused Faith with dignity and graciousness! 1981 brought Pr. Harold Banks. A gifted musician, he encouraged us

with the singing of the liturgy! During his tenure, Holy Communion was established as an "every Sunday" event, we began our outreach to Mountain Ranch Lutheran community, and Synod decided to drop all financial support - and against all odds, we survived and thrived!! All subsequent pastors continued to serve at both Mtn. Ranch and Murphys congregations. Pastor Tim Feaser (from 1982-1988) was known as the "building" Pastor - we had our first Capital Fund Appeal, doubled our attendance, built a parsonage, and built our present church. A lively time, with two Feaser baby boys being born in Murphys! From 1990-1994 Pr. Michael Mortvedt established contemporary services, began our Evangelism programs, and realized our dream of creating the Faith Lutheran Child Care Center. He and wife Joan organized our 25th Anniversary fete and were instrumental in our community action during the Old Gulch Fire (feeding many people!!). Pr. Milo "Ken" Anderson from 1995-1999 pushed our ecumenical and community-action boundaries to include Habitat for Humanity, Satellite Food Pantries, and both Boy/Girl Scouts. Through Ken's enthusiasm and energy we began to share our church facility with other groups. In 2000 we welcomed Pr. Eric Yochheim - a Visioning Committee was formed, Mutual Ministries established, our first Men's Group began, and the initial planning started for a Fellowship Hall. From 2005-2014, Pr. Doug Merritt worked diligently to bring the Fellowship Hall to fruition and to established the Murphys Senior Center. And thanks to the Merritt Family Trust, the Senior Center was able to open a very successful Thrift Store in our old Mitchler House church! Once again we were blessed with a wonderful, caring interim - Pr. Ron Zielski - who kept us functioning for two years until the arrival of our present pastor - Pastor Karen Johnson, who brings with her an enthusiasm for small town and rural ministries. Once again we are blessed with a pastor with vision and a willingness to work with others for the betterment of our church and to proclaim the Gospel in Calaveras County. We are looking forward to the next 50 years!



Hope Lutheran Church Walnut Creek, CA

Hope Lutheran Church officially became a congregation on May 19, 1968. We own no property and have utilized the facilities at Rossmoor in Walnut Creek for worship and other activities.

Hope was served by Pastors Edward Hamme, Milton Johnson, George Norman and David Romeis from its beginning until 1999. The congregation then was not able to afford to have a pastor and was served by seminarians from

Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary for 10 years. Jack Niemi was called to be the Pastor of Hope on September 1, 2009, as a final attempt to discern whether Hope had a viable future. Pastor Karen Woida joined the staff in 2013.

Today Hope is a vibrant congregation with a membership of 125 and an average worship attendance of 96. In 2017 Hope remitted benevolences of \$26,305.

In thanksgiving for its role in keeping Hope alive during a difficult decade, Hope has committed to funding a \$50,000 Scholarship at PLTS as a part of our 50th Anniversary year. We are pleased Bishop Mark Holmerud led our 50th Anniversary Worship on May 13, 2018.

25th Anniversary as a Congregation

New Hope Lutheran Church Foresthill, CA

New Hope Lutheran Church, 22200 Foresthill Road, Foresthill, California, celebrates its 25th anniversary as a congregation in 2018. Started as a satellite ministry of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Auburn in 1982, New Hope was strong enough to be chartered as a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America on October 31, 1993.

New Hope's first building was constructed largely with volunteer labor in over a year's time and was dedicated on October 31, 1994. Sunday School classrooms were added in 2002. Many community activities and congregational ministries have called New Hope their "home."

A community celebration of New Hope's 25th anniversary will be held on Sunday, June 10. Interim Pastor Mark Vance will preside and preach at the 9:30 a.m. worship service, and a community brunch will be held immediately afterwards. Sierra Pacific Synod Bishop Mark W. Holmerud will be with the congregation on Sunday, October 14.

50th Anniversary of Ordination



Rev. Dr. Hoy-San Loke

I was born in Malaysia in a small beautiful town of Manglembu which was known for its world's famous ground-nuts. My parents were migrated from Canton, China in 1930. Both were teachers of the Chinese Confucianism School. Four cute and handsome boys were born to the family.

I married to Anne Lee in 1964, but then missed her to eternity in October 3, 2006. We have four children, son, Wai Kong with wife Jamie and daughter, Wai Ling with husband Tom.

While I was a senior in high school, a missionary from the German Basal Lutheran mission which was sponsored by the Lutheran Church in America begun to share the Christian faith to our community. With three high school classmates we began to be impressed by the teaching of Christianity. Finally with faith and love to Jesus Christ the four of us were baptized into the Christian faith at Grace Lutheran Church in Manglembu, Malaysia.

Graduated from high school I began to look for my goal in the future. I had a deep conviction to become a missionary Pastor. After my father's death, my mother had no means to support four of us for further education.

God always opens a way for his children. With my Pastor's recommendation I was granted a scholarship to study in the Chinese University in Hong Kong where I earned a B.A. degree in 1963, followed by studying at the Lutheran theological Seminary in Hong Kong. Because of shortage of Pastors in Singapore and Malaysia, before completing the theological training, I was called to return to Singapore to develop a new church. As students, my wife Anne and I work to develop a congregation and at the same time to complete our theological studies at the Trinity Theological College in Singapore. I earned a B.Th./M.div. Degrees in 1966 and became Co-Pastors of the Queenstown Lutheran Church in Singapore. In 1975 I earned a doctoral degree from the Andover Newton Theological School in Newton, Massachusetts USA.
